Carolyn and I attended the District 27 Conference in Charlotte this past weekend. It was both enjoyable and informative. I very much appreciated the fact that fellow CLSPS members Bill and June Reasons and Lloyd and Jane Moore were there also. The morning session on Saturday consisted of two excellent presentations. First, we learned about a seafarer's decoding of ancient Irish Symbols dating between 3200BC and 3101BC. Later Capt. Joe Dibella gave us a presentation on a now 65 year old boat named Cricket II that was used to study and catch sharks as well as giant bluefish, some of the first instances of offshore sport fishing beginning back in the 1950s. The afternoon session was highlighted by an open discussion with Vice Commander Gary Cheney, the National Representative, and Past Chief Commander John Alter.



# **Getting Ready for Spring 2016**

As you begin to put the boat away, or keep it ready for immediate use, review the following for safe cruising:

Display of numbers - NC registration and/or documentation number Registration/documentation Personal flotation devices (PFD) Visual distress Signals (VDS) Fire extinguishers Ventilation (gas powered) Backfire Flame Control (gas powered) Navigation Lights Pollution Placard (our examiners can give you one) MARPOL Trash Placard (our examiners can give you one) Marine Sanitation Devices Navigation Rules (for all vessels over 39.4 feet or 12 meters) Sate and or local requirements Deck Free of Hazards. Clean Bilge Electrical - Fuel Systems Galley – Heating Systems.

Marine Radio Dewatering Device & Backup Mounted Fire Extinguishers Anchor and Line for Area First Aid d Kit and PIW Kits Inland Visual Distress Signals Capacity/Certificate of Compliance other areas of awareness: Accident reporting – owner responsibility Offshore operations Nautical charts/navigation aids Survival tips/first aid Fueling/fuel management Float plan/weather and sea conditions Insurance considerations Boating checklist Safe boating classes Maritime domain awareness

#### **Test Your Inflatable Life Jackets!**

I'm currently teaching the ABC class, and when I got to the section on Life Jackets, I demonstrated several different types.

Jane and I each have a SOSPENDERS offshore model, and I brought Jane's to the class. I noticed there was some corrosion on the CO<sub>2</sub> cylinder, so I decided to inflate it and replace the cylinder.

To my surprise, and horror, when the bladder inflated, one of the seams failed.

I've been testing these, probably not often enough, using the manual tube to blow it up, so I didn't have to replace the \$25 - \$35 re-arming kit. I'm rethinking this procedure.

Admittedly, these life jackets are about 10 years old, but still, it never occurred to me that it could fail.

I tested my inflatable, and it operated as designed and the bladder held. It's the same age as the one that failed, however, and we've replaced both with new ones. I plan to testinflate these yearly, as recommended, and I think using the CO<sub>2</sub> cartridge every three years would be prudent.

Thankfully, Jane wasn't overboard when the life jacket failed.

# "BY A WIDTH OF A WHEATIES FLAKE"

"Wyatt looks in, pumps, throws, Musial swings, there's a groundball to Reese who backhands it to his right, throws off balance to Camelli who scoops it out of the dirt and 'Stan the Man' is out at first by a width of a Wheaties flake." Yup, I can still hear the voice of my penpal, Walter Lanier 'Red' Barber sitting up high in the 'Catbird seat' in back of home plate at Ebbets Field in Brooklyn, N.Y. It had to be in 1940 or '41. Red could broadcast a Dodgers game, and without TV, you could visualize exactly what was going on. Stan wasn't out by much and you could hear (see) how close the play was: "By the width of a Wheaties flake."

"Horatio, how many times in our lives have we just missed something and benefited by whatever happened? I'm lucky to be alive today because I missed the train by a width of whatever and learned shortly afterwards that my train was in a terrible crash which killed a lot of passengers."

"My goodness, P/C, I recall cannon balls zipping by my head through battles in which I never wanted to be engaged. I lost pieces of my hat to shrapnel passing within the width of a pencil lead. That's close. By the way, why are we spending time on widths this morning?"

"I'll tell you why. I watch the storm, Joaquin, quickly form just southeast of our mainland, and become a category 4 hurricane. Accuweather kept me informed as weather developed. It has rained here in Trent Woods fairly steadily for a couple of weeks. The ground is wet and soft. If Joaquin had not turned and moved north or northeast, I estimate more than half the mighty oak trees in Trent Woods would be laying on the ground. Houses would be in two, and the sail and power vessels in the area would be demolished. "Yup, and the current weather is changing for the better. The barometer is going up. I know the rains are stopping and the winds are lessening in force. Autumn 2015 will move in and another kind of flake soon will make an appearance. Anyone care to guess what kind? Brrrr."

# WALLY'S LAWS OF BOATING

Law of Below Decks Repair: As soon as your hands become coated with grease, your nose will begin to itch and you'll have to pee. The possibility of this occurring is greatest when you are trapped in the engine room.

Bilge's Law: Any tool, nut, bolt or screw, when dropped, will roll to the deepest and least accessible part of the bilge.

The inverse of this law dictates that no perfect docking shall ever have anyone in attendance to prove you actually did it.

Wake's Law: The percentage probability of being waked is increased by the size of the power boat coming up on you, and further increased by the narrowness of the channel.

Law of Crossed Legs: The likelihood of having another boat nearby increases directly with the urgency of your need to pee over the side.

Law of Close Encounters: The probability of meeting someone from your yacht club or marina increases dramatically when you are out on a PWC and going crazy with it.

Service Department Law: When you try to prove to a mechanic that a machine won't work, it will. Every Time. The inverse of this law states that the likelihood of the machine's failing again approaches 100 percent as you board the boat.

Law of the Anchorage: At any anchorage, the possibility of you getting a spot close in is inversely proportional to your boat's draft. The possibility is further decreased by the imminence of bad weather and high winds.

First Beer After Anchoring Law: As soon as you sit down to a cold drink after anchoring, your boat will begin to drag. This is especially true if you have shut down the engine.

The Law of **0300**: The likelihood of your boat dragging anchor is greatest at **0300**.

Law of Thunder and Lightning: The odds of a major thunder and lightning storm occurring are greatest at 0300 if your boat is dragging anchor.

Murphy's Law of Proximity: If you & your loved one are the only boat in a beautiful, remote anchorage with a gorgeous sunset coming on, the possibility of a powerboat filled with noisy obnoxious teenagers & PWCs approaches 100 percent.

Law of Physical Surfaces: The chance of your smartphone landing on the deck and sliding overboard is directly correlated to the newness and cost of said phone.

Oliver's Law of Public Speaking: A VHF will always be keyed open when you least expect it. A corollary to this law dictates that the dumber your remark, the greater the number of people you know will be listening.
