Education Officer

There is lots of news from the Education Department this month as our schedule for 2017 comes together. We have courses scheduled, preliminary dates for our 2017 seminar series, and exciting opportunities at the Oriental In-Water Boat Show in April. There are also opportunities to teach a seminar and, potentially, our Seamanship course.

Classes Scheduled

We have scheduled two sessions of America's Boating Course (ABC), beginning on April 18 and October 21. As we did last year, we will be presenting the course in two full-day Saturday sessions, followed by a Sunday afternoon session on the water to put course material into practice. Students learn essential safety information, boat handling techniques, and navigation skills, and earn the NC Boater Education Certificate, which is required for boat operators under the age of twenty-six. New in April is the possibility that we'll be able to add boat handling simulation sessions to the course using USPS's Virtual Trainer. If you know someone who is a candidate for the ABC class, have them contact me.

We have Advanced Piloting (AP) tentatively scheduled to begin September 26, with at least six students already committed. There is interest in a Seamanship class as well. Let me know if you are interested in these classes or any others.

We're planning an eight-week seminar series in late spring/early summer. Vessel Safety Check Program

Boat Smart From The Start with a Free Vessel Safety Check

Introduction

The mission of the Recreational Boating Safety program is to minimize the loss of life, personal injury, property damage and negative environmental impact associated with the use of recreational boats through preventive means. The VSC program supports one of the program's key goals: To improve the demonstrated knowledge, skills, abilities and behaviors of boaters.

The VSC program helps to achieve voluntary compliance with the federal, state and local recreational boating safety laws, particularly regarding the carriage of safety equipment. It also heightens the boaters awareness of safety issues through one-on-one contact by volunteer vessel examiners. The results are not reported to any law enforcement agency.

What Is a Vessel Safety Check

It is a free check of a vessel's equipment for compliance with federal, state and local safety requirements.

Some of the items we check are:

- Proper display of numbers
- Registration/Documentation
- Personal Flotation Devices
- Visual Distress Signals
- Fire Extinguishers
- Ventilation
- Backfire Flame Control
- Sound Producing Devices
- Navigation Lights
- State and Local Requirements
- Overall Vessel Condition

Boating Safety Education

During the Vessel Safety Check the vessel examiner has an opportunity to discuss with a fellow boater the purpose of the marine safety equipment, to clarify various federal, state, and local regulations, to review local boating conditions, to answer any boating-related safety questions and to encourage additional boater education.

Some of the topics are:

- Accident Reporting
- Charts and Aids
- Survival Tips
- Fueling/Fuel management
- Float Plan
- Weather and Sea Conditions
- Safe Boating Classes

Benefits of a Vessel Safety Check: A Vessel Safety Check can identify SAFETY and money saving opportunities:

- By preventing citations by meeting federal and state and local safety equipment requirements
- By identifying educational and equipment-related possible boating insurance discounts
- by increasing awareness of safety practices to avoid accidents and costly breakdowns.

A Vessel Safety Check is available from any members of our USPS team listed elsewhere in the Outlook.

AMATEUR THAT I AM

P/C WILLAIM J. ASH SN, <u>H</u>, N2GAH

I was sitting in my study wearing ear phones looking as though I knew all about the complex business of radio. Yes, I was sitting there in front of a radio transceiver; I was wearing ear phones; I was listening to voices coming through my ICOM-736 system and knowing a lot less about amateur radio than I did in 1978 when I earned my first amateur radio license.

The radio business has gotten, for me, much more complicated than I ever dreamed it would be. I'm not a natural when it comes to electronics; my life's work centered upon cells, tissues and organ systems, normal and abnormal. Nevertheless, I sweated through a radio examination, passed it and obtained a novice ticket to transmit radio signals around the globe. Initially, I was permitted to send only Morse code but I labored (four tries) to gain a more prestigious license which permitted me to use voice transmission. I've made countless contacts, mainly from Europe and South America and have enjoyed making friends who have all spoken English. "Ah, P/C, I found you. The cold temperatures are keeping you inside, are they? What is that strange looking gadget you are fiddling with? It looks as though you might be controlling artillery pieces from afar." Hornblower was a brilliant naval warrior but, to be sure, he knew less than I about radio communications.

"Horatio, you are looking at a radio transceiver which receives radio signals so I may listen to someone talking to me from near

and far and, Horatio, it enables me to speak, using this microphone, to the person speaking to me. Complicated, eh? If you look outside you should see the single wire strung between two oak trees and connecting to other wires connecting to the rear of this transceiver. It's called a G5RV antenna. When I speak through this microphone, generated signals move through the antenna out into space at the speed of light (186,282 miles per second) and are received via antennas and receivers or transceivers somewhere on the planet. A person listening may return a message to me and the conversation begins. I know you have never learned anything about this, but maybe someday you might consider having fun with a radio aboard Lydia. You would need a license and a battery to operate from your frigate. I have recommended to a number of sailors that they qualify for amateur licenses so they might call for help should an occasion arise. You might accompany me to the next meeting of the local amateur radio club. There you will find radio operators who know much more than I about this artful science, and I'll treat you to dinner which precedes each meeting. How can you lose? Horatio, learning the business of amateur radio is lots of fun. Yes, it requires lots of study, but it is sure worth the effort. And think of all the new friends you will have. Best I get back to my radio."

Fleece Vest: We have it in navy, but it can be ordered in other colors.


Sizes S, Med., Lg., and XLg (Ladies and Mens) sell for \$36.00. XXLg sells for \$40.00.
