Nationally in 2017, there were 1,522 inspectors and there were 27,418 vessel safety inspections.

During the D27 Spring Council/Conference, we provided many New Bern brochures, a reservation information and flyer of the activities planned for the rendezvous the weekend of June 8-10, 2018. Our new Chief Commander Gary Cheney, SN (Erie/11) is an associate member of the Raleigh Sail & Power Squadron. There are currently 350 Squadrons across the nation and 27,000 members. A change to the National Bylaws was proposed and passed. The rationale: "to alter the operational structure of struggling squadrons to prevent and help them from dissolving."

AMERICA'S BOATING CLUB®

How many times have you talked about the United States Power Squadrons® to boating friends and gotten a blank look? Well now we have a way to talk about our organization that helps us connect better to the boating public. USPS has trademarked an alternate brand – America's Boating Club®.

For a long time the USPS national organization and individual squadrons have wrestled with the idea of changing our name because it is often not even recognized as being connected with boating. Unfortunately changing our name is expensive and has many downsides.

But using another brand, one owned and registered by the United States Power Squadrons, gives us many of the advantages of changing our name without many of the costs. Businesses do this all the time. The GAP, for example, uses four other brands to appeal to different groups – Old Navy, Banana Republic, Athleta and Intermix. We are legally the United States Power Squadrons, but we are also America's Boating Club. Likewise we are legally *Your Squadron* Sail and Power Squadron but we are also either *Your Squadron*'s Boating Club or America's Boating Club, *Your Squadron*.

The new brand also does a better job of encompassing all parts of our organization. As a club we are seen as a social organization that has fun as well as providing great boating education and public service.

The new logo incorporates the Ship's Wheel and a forward-looking graphic indicating water and sail, power and manually powered boats. It also uses the USPS colors and fonts.

During the transition, we are encouraged to use both brands with connecting wording. For example:

There is also an alternative version of the logo that can be used as a letterhead or a newsletter masthead. It can also be combined with the local squadron or district name and/or flag.

The time to transition to the new logo is indefinite. National has made some suggestions on how individual squadrons may use the new logo. But the rules and the timing are not hard and fast in order to



allow time for squadrons to adapt to the new concept. Many of you know that in the last couple of years we have changed to brand standards that made sure that the United States Power Squadrons name and logo were presented in the primary position and specific ways. Competitions and awards were given only to squadrons and districts that adhered to these detailed standards. dangerous

The America's Boating Club transition is being handled differently. This is a significant transition to a new way of promoting ourselves, so squadrons and districts are being given guidance but are encouraged to proceed with the approaches and schedule that fits their needs. The real requirement is that in some way America's Boating Club is shown to be owned by the United States Power Squadrons. The use of both logos and the possible wordings above indicate that. America's Boating Club should appear with an ® and somewhere on the page it must show that America's Boating Club is owned by the United States Power Squadrons.

What will you see soon for *Your Squadron*? You may start seeing it in emails or any written communication. We can try a changing the mailing page in new issues of *Your Squadron's* Newsletter.

We will probably move to using the new logo on our website and eventually on the masthead of *Your Squadron's* newsletter when we reprint colored mastheads again. We need to decide where and how we want to use the name in official ways.

But you don't have to wait for that. In your conversations with others, including boaters, remember

Cruising with Cape Lookout Sail & Power Squadron

Boating season is upon us, and I'm sure everyone is anxious to get out on the water. One of the best parts of boat trips is cruising with friends and meeting at the end of the day to share the experiences.

We've put together a schedule of cruises, with an eye on making it interesting for everyone, no matter what type of vessel you have, or even if you are "between boats." Which of these cruises interest you? Let me know early, especially for the upcoming trips, so we can make plans.

Day Trip to Oriental - Wed. April 18

Sail/cruise to Oriental, timing our arrival in time for lunch at a local restaurant, and visiting the great shops, then return home. Land yachts welcome.

River Dunes/Ocracoke - Thurs. May 24 to?

Starting in New Bern, or wherever your boat is, we'll cruise to River Dunes, about 30 nm. Some boaters may want to stay aboard overnight, others may want to look into getting a room. We'd spend two nights, and enjoy the marina's facilities on the day between the two nights. Some members with runabouts may want to travel to River Dunes on the 2nd day to join us, then leave in time to return home before the sun goes down. Land yachts can meet us at River Dunes.

For the adventuresome, we'll leave from there and head to Ocracoke, about 25 nm. We would plan to stay at the Park Service docks, but there are several marinas with transient slips. Lots to do and see in Ocracoke, so we'd plan to spend 3-4 days. Many shops, restaurants, hiking trails, beautiful beaches. The Ocrafolk festival is scheduled for the weekend of June 1-3. Some may want to stay for the festival.

South River - June 15 to 17

Cruise to South River, about 32 nm. Stay at least 2 nights, exploring the area, including Lukens Cemetery, and generally just chill out. Members with runabouts may want to join us for the day, then either head home, or get a slip

in Oriental for the night. There are no facilities in South River.

July 4th Fireworks - July 4

Raft up in the Neuse off Union Point for the fireworks. Meet in late afternoon, potluck, invite non-boat owners to join as crew. Some may want to anchor overnight, others head back to home port.

Upper Neuse River - July 14

Day trip for smaller boats, about 16 miles, round trip. We can raft up for lunch, or return to New Bern and have lunch (or dinner) at the Galley Store & Marina.

Trent River - Aug 25

A fun day trip for smaller boats, through the Croatan Forest to Pollocksville. Picnic at the boat ramp/park in Pollocksville.

Cape Lookout & Beaufort -Sep 11 - 16

This is a multi-part cruise with multiple destinations and even different routes, depending on each skipper's preference. There will be opportunities to anchor out overnight, 1-day excursions for smaller runabouts, and one or two days in Beaufort Docks.

Day 1: Sail/cruise to Adam's Creek (Cedar Creek anchorage), about 25 nm. Anchor overnight

Day 2: Cruise the ICW and Beaufort Inlet to Cape Lookout, about 20 nm.

Day 3 to 5: Anchor in the Bight, off Power Squadron Spit. Beaches, shelling, hiking, climb the light house.

Day 6: Cruise back to Beaufort, get a slip in Beaufort Docks. Other options would be:

Land yachts: Drive to Beaufort to join us for the day, or stay overnight in a hotel or B&B.

Runabouts: Cruise to Beaufort to join us for the day, or stay overnight in hotel or B&B. Maritime museum, great shops, restaurants.

Day 7: Head back to New Bern, or anchor overnite at Cedar Creek or Clubfoot Creek. Questions? Contact P/C Lloyd Moore lloyd.moore@suddenlink.net

Reports of Horatio accompanying P/C on the voyage of the Zuiderdam to the Panama Canal were incorrect. Captain Hornblower had been ordered to attend meetings of the Admiralty on the Island of Bermuda only a day before the Zuiderdam was scheduled to leave Fort Lauderdale.
