

#### **America's Boating Course**

We received an inquiry from the Tri-Community Volunteer Fire Department (TCVFD) about helping them with training their volunteers in the operation of their rescue boat. Many of the members have little or no boating experience, and the Fire Department is called on for rescue operations on the Neuse River and the many tributaries in the area.

I met with Jeanette Gaskins, President of TCVFD and Chief Jimmy Hart to discuss how we may help. We agreed that we should schedule an ABC class in the near future, and if possible, with the help of some of our members with experience in handling small boats, put together a program of on-the-water training.

The timeframe for beginning the training would be late August, which will give us a chance to prepare.

The TCVFD is located in Bridgeton, NC, in a beautiful well-equipped brandnew firehouse. The spacious auditorium, equipped with built-in projection system, will be perfect for the classroom portion of the training. I asked if it might be possible for CLSPS to use the facility for an ABC class

offered to the public, and they were very positive, and willing to let us use the facility.

#### **Advanced/Elective classes**

I have had several inquiries regarding advanced and elective classes. Several new members are interested in the new Boat Handling class, which has grown out of the older Seamanship class. I know there are several members who are anxious to take the Offshore Navigation (JN) class, and also Marine Electronics. I will be looking for instructors for these classes, so if you'd like to help out, please let me know.



### **Radio Checks Update**

For several years, SeaTow offered a free VHF radio check but stopped doing it in October 2020. U.S. Coast Guard continues to offer an automated digital selective calling (DSC) test call capability from each of its Rescue 21 coastal stations. All fixed mount marine radios certified by the Federal **Communications Commission since** 1999 are required to have a DSC capability. All such radios sold since 2011 must also have a DSC test call capability. Marine radios transmitting and successfully receiving a response from a DSC test call can be expected to operate acceptably in the voice mode as well.

To perform a DSC test call, enter the Coast Guard's coast station group identity "003669999" into the radio's DSC memory. Once entered and stored, a DSC test call can be made by executing the following three steps:

- Select "Test Call" from the radio's DSC menu,
- Select the USCG number entered into memory, and
- Transmit the call.

The radio display should indicate when that test call is acknowledged and display the acknowledging station's nine-digit identity. That identity may be different than the group identity previously entered into memory.

**NOTE:.** Use VHF channel 09 for the radio check...NOT channel 16.

"Let's compromise and spell it Cabisch. See you at the yacht club, P/C. Hmmm, is it C or K? Ah, never mind."


# June's Jokes

- 21. My luck is like a bald guy who just won a comb.






