

Squadron Health - 328 Squadrons

- Eleven squadrons are in the process of dissolution
- Five more are on the hold/watch list
- Ten squadrons are on waiver program
- Twenty-five squadrons have 10 members or less

- Two squadrons show o members
- 185 squadrons have less than 50 members (CLSPS = 49)
- Two districts recently combined into one

Committee conclusions:

- Committee believes there is still time to right the ship.
- ...the problem is not limited revenue, it is a lack of prioritized, strategic spending of those revenues under a plan.
- There is a shrinking window of opportunity to save our organization...
- Unless USPS plans and invests strategically right now, the future of continued declining membership and revenues, with increasing costs, is grim.



America's Great Loop Cruising Association (AGLCA) is an organization promoting cruising Long Distances in North America. AGLCA holds seminars






and rendezvous for prospective and active Loopers. AGLCA, 500 Oakbrook Lane, Summerville, SC 29485 877-478-5667, www.greatloop.org

The people that do the Loop are known as "Loopers". You start with a



white burgee with the AGLCA logo, identifying your boat to all that the boat is doing the loop. When you complete the loop, you notify AGCLA and for a fee you receive the gold burgee to signify to all that you have completed the loop. This is all on the honor system. When you say you have done it all, then you receive the burgee.



There are many different routes to do the Loop. Generally you have to navigate the Eastern Seaboard via the ICW, the Hudson River, New York State Canals, the Great Lakes, the Canadian Canals, the Great USA Waterways (The Illinois, Mississippi, Ohio, Cumberland, Tennessee, Tombigbee Rivers) The Gulf of Mexico and then go around or through Florida.

You can start anywhere, stop and start again, do it in one year or take 10. You travel thru 14 states and one province. Most do it in a trawler at approximately six knots makes you realize how large and grand this nation is. This is a relaxing and totally different experience from driving the highways at 70 MPH


