# Modern Square Sails Text and Photos by Marty Warner

Square rigged sailing ships have been around for a very long time. Setting and dousing square sails takes a lot of people, and it's a bit dangerous. In fact it's so dangerous that for modern cruise sailing ships it is not allowed to have your crew aloft at night. So that means either you take down the square sails at sunset or you leave them up betting the the wind won't change much. Training ships such as the Coast Guard Sailing Ship *Eagle* don't have to abide by these rules.

On the *Star Flyer* they use a roller furling-type rig to bring in or let out their square sails. The yards are hollow aluminum tubes with a bar inside to roll the sails up. At each end of the yard is a hydraulic motor that turns the bar. The bar has a slot in it where the sail is attached. As the bar is turned, the sail rolls up around the bar—very similar to an old style sun shade on your window at home.

It takes 3 men to set or douse the sail. The Officer On Deck (OOD) operates a controller that runs the hydraulic motor to either roll out, or bring in the sail. To set the sail he pushes the button to roll out the sail. Two Able Seamen (AB) are on deck on either side of the mast. They each have a big electric winch that they use to keep tension on the sail as it is rolled out. When the OOD calls, "Make Fast", he

takes his finger off the button, and the ABs trim the sail to the OOD's satisfaction.

The square sail is made up of two parts: the bonnet and the sail itself. The bonnet is a long strip of sailcloth about a foot wide and as long as the yard. The top edge of the bonnet has a bolt rope sewn in the edge, and that bolt rope goes in a slot in the bar—just like the foot of a mainsail goes in the boom. The other long edge of the Bonnet has cringles or eyes sewn in, and each one is numbered. The sail itself has cringles along the head (top edge) of the sail and they are numbered to match with the numbers on the Bonnet.

Normally the Bonnet stays attached to the bar and if the sail needs to be dropped, it is untied from the Bonnet and dropped to the deck for sail repairs. In our case both the sail and the bonnet were damaged a few days before we started our cruise. Both were repaired while we were underway, and with a few days to go before the end or our crossing we got to watch as the rigger, Marvin, and his #2 man put the bonnet and the sail back on while we were underway.

In the morning the bonnet was put on. Marvin had the bonnet all rolled up and he went aloft and out on the





starboard side of the yard and started feeding the bonnet into the bar. His #2 had a small rope attached to the end of the Bonnet and he pulled the Bonnet across the yard as Marvin fed it into the bar.


In the afternoon the sail was folded—accordion style—on the deck. Then small lines (stops) were tied around the sail so that it made a long sausage. The sail was dragged out to the foredeck where a line from aloft was tied to the middle of the "sausage", now we have a "U". Then the sail is raised above the yard where the sail will be tied to the bonnet. The crew work from the middle and start using a long line to "tie" the sail to the bonnet—matching the numbers on the cringles

Once the sail is attached to the bonnet, the crew works together to add the sheets from the corner of the sail to the yard below and then on down to the deck where it will be controlled.

The stops are removed, and the sail falls down controlled only by the sheets.

This job took over 3 hours to complete. I talked to Marvin afterwards. The harness they wear has no seat, it's three straps:one around the waist and one around each thigh. For that long time it was like a tourniquet around their legs, and they had to stop occasionally to get the circulation back in their legs.
