

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CAPE LOOKOUT SAIL and POWER SQUADRON BRIDGE

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First I would like to thank Jane and her bridge for all the work that they have done. As I look at the demographics of our squadron I see an older generation. To keep this squadron viable we need to recruit new and younger members.

I and many of my friends have been given orders not to boat alone. This is a great opportunity for us to make new friends and the possibility to recruit new members. I propose that each of us ask a younger friend to go out boating with then and I will ask the bridge and our webmaster if there is a way to incorporate that into our web page. A young man told me that at his school there is an app. that lets people ask questions and those questions are posted to the rest of the class for anyone to answer. I think we should look into this as a way to get younger people out on the water and help keep our older members safe.

Our squadron is doing great work inspecting boats and finding geodetic markers. Many of these community service projects are taking place at either a boat ramp or marina where people already know about our organization. I would ask that each of our members reach out to the membership of the other originations that they belong to and explain about USPS. At that time they can offer anyone interested a chance to attend one of our squadron's functions as a guest of the squadron whether it be a monthly meetings or one of our outings. Our web site already has information about marinas and launch sites but we have to tell people about it. If our website becomes known as a source for information it will increase the squadron's exposure. The more our webpage is viewed the more opportunities we will have to recruit new members.

I know that the things I am proposing require more computer skills than I currently have. Maybe, with Leslie's help, this will drag me kicking and screaming into the 20th century and hopefully it will recruit some new members.

Did you know.....

It's a beautiful day to sail out to Cape Lookout and you are making a comfortable 5 knots down Adams Creek. Your radio comes to life with the tug BC10 making a securite call to all concerned vessels that he is entering the north end of Adams creek enroute to the state port in Morehead City. Checking your AIS, you see an arrowhead icon passing "1AC". Opening the info box, you learn it is the BC10 making 10 knots and coming vour way with 1 barge loaded with phosphate. No need to panic, the BC10 and the Pamlico tugs are both operated by professional captains that are very good at what they do. They want to move their loads as quickly and safely as possible and that means passing a lot of boats in tight spaces. As you keep an eye on the AIS you watch the icon getting closer and the AIS starts to warn you that you are in danger of a collision. Still no need to get excited. The captain on the BC10 knows where you are and soon, he calls you asking to make a "2 whistle pass". A what?

Somewhere you remember hearing about the Rules of the Road and stand

on and burdened vessels. Since you are in the lead, you are the privileged or stand on vessel. The BC10 is overtaking you so that makes him the burdened vessel and he must pass you with as little disturbance as possible. OK, let's go back to "2 whistle". Since he knows the waterway so well, he is ASKING if he can turn his bow to port and pass along your port side and if you agree, he will ease up along your port side and pass you safely.

A lot of mariners often interpret the Rules of the Road too literally and don't use any common sense. The Rule about overtaking instructs the stand on vessel to "maintain course and speed." That works great in open water where the overtaking vessel has a lot of room to maneuver but in the very restricted channel of Adams Creek, it would be more comfortable if you slow down to where you can keep control of your steering and move safely to the right so the BC10 can slow as he passes you and make less of a wake. After he passes, quickly cross his wake, and drop in behind him as he pulls away and you won't be bounced around so much.

VSE's for this year are off to a slow start. Partially due to COVID, weather, and examiners being out of town. I fully suspect that is about to change as the weather warms up and people begin to think more about being out on the water. As you prepare your vessel for the coming season, give some serious thought about contacting one of our examiners to get your free vessel safety check. It never hurts to have someone go over the list of items you need to have on your vessel to have a safe season, AND, make sure you are good to go when the USCG or NC Wildlife Officers stop you for a safety check. Often times, when either of these agencies see that vou have a current VSE sticker displayed on your vessel they will simply wish you a "good day" and send you on your way. I know this to be true from personal experience as well as hearing from some folks who I have done safety checks for

in the past. At any rate, I hope those of you who still have boats have a safe and enjoyable 2022 boating season.

It was a very bright and sunny day by the river at the yacht club; temperatures had climbed to the mid seventies and the atmosphere was barely disturbed by a paltry breeze. It was a day aspiring mariners prayed for to apply the last touches on a family yacht before undertaking a day on the waters of the mighty Trent River. A more picturesque day could not exist. The only thorn to prick the sensibilities was the donnybrook between Russians and the assaulted Ukrainians. Mounting gasoline prices and empty shelves gave evidence the skirmish had begun to affect us here in the western hemisphere. Or did it?


