

From the USPS Pledge: "..... Promote high standards of navigation and seamanship; Maintain my boat and operate it legally:..."

We have 23 squadron members who have boats according to the Cape Lookout Sail and Power Squadron roster. Last year 2 members had their vessels checked by one of our VSE examiners. To me, there is something wrong with this picture. We are supposed to do what our pledge indicates, yet there seems to be little interest in promoting the VSE program within our own squadron. This is not to say that some have chosen to have a VSE by the USCG Auxiliary which would accomplish the goal of assuring the vessel did meet safety requirement.

Bottom line: our VSE Examiners are standing by to do a vessel safety check of your vessel. If you no longer have a boat, but some family member, friend, neighbor, etc. has a boat let them know that we can help them assure that their boat meets the necessary safety requirements for this boating season. Sail, power, paddle craft, or PWC all qualify for a VSE sticker. The contact information for our VSExaminers is listed elsewhere in "The Outlook"
