

Our Examiners have had the opportunity to complete a near record number of Vessel Safety Checks in the months of April and



May. On May 7, we were at Camp Wayfarer where we completed 343 vscs. Total to date is 442. We also checked 10 boats at the Eastern Carolina Yacht Club. The most vscs we ever did was in 2019 when we completed 460. So, we are only 18 short of our "record" for a given year.

With the number of members we have in our squadron it should be able to exceed 460 vscs quite easily. However, to date, we have not had any members request a safety check.

Remember our examiners can do a safety check of your vessel wherever it may be: at your home, in your marina, even in your driveway. Just contact us and we help you make sure your vessel is prepared safety wise for this boating season. Doesn't matter if your boat is 50 feet in length, sail or power, or a paddlecraft, i.e. canoe, kayak or paddleboard.



Drone event at Lawson's on the Creek Restaurant

WHAT IT WAS LIKE P/C WILLIAM J. ASH SN EMERITUS

After my completing graduate-work at Cornell in 1959 the Ash Family moved from Ithaca, N.Y. to the Eastport-Speonk-Westhampton area on eastern Long Island, the island in the Atlantic Ocean on which I was born. We built a house with water rights close to Beaver Dam Creek in Westhampton. Now, keep in mind, the Creek emptied into, and out of, the eastern end of Moriches Bay. The bay poured into, and out of, an inlet, or outlet, to and from the Atlantic Ocean. From the beginning of the Atlantic Ocean we could take our boat to any place having navigable waters. The Ash Family was now free to go. Only two major problems existed. Only two, mind you.

Go ahead, laugh! I don't care. I've had bigger problems. The first problem concerned a boat. I didn't have one. The second concerned me. I knew how to row a boat; my Dad taught me that when I was a small boy. But outboards, plotting courses, inboards, electrical systems, thunderstorms, currents, reciprocal bearings, sun, moon, planet and star sights? I needed help, lots of help. By a stroke of good luck I happened upon a very small note in the local newspaper concerning a boating course being offered by the Peconic Bay Power Squadron; local high school, 1900 hrs, day of the week for 15 weeks. It was called Piloting (America's Boating Course). I signed on. This turned out to be one of the best moves I ever made. It was the year 1961.

Piloting (America's Boating Course) was given by a cadre of uniformed members of Peconic Bay. Overhead projections, use of the blackboard, questions and answers and discussions of all matters of things nautical by members with experience made for one heck of a course. I'd found out how much there was to know about the primary needs of the boater. Fifteen weeks of instruction and review, taking the final exam and learning that I passed it was a feather in my cap. But it was only the beginning.


Students who passed the course (not all did) were asked if they would consider joining the Squadron. "Yes" passers were given interviews by a committee to determine their likelihood of contributing to nautical safety. Those considered fit to help were invited to join, and I was one. Within a few months I passed Seamanship. It was still 1961. I decided to learn more about getting from point A to point B, from the chart and on the water, by signing aboard Advanced Piloting (Advanced Marine Navigation) which every member should have on his/her record. It was an adventure of a lifetime. I passed this very demanding course in 1962.

Here's a way to handle an issue you have already thought about. It relates to on-line courses. What do you do when problems arise and there is no instructor to answer your questions? Pretend three students decide to study Weather, on-line. When all three are ready, let's say after the first two chapters, the group meets at a local spot for coffee, tea, whatever, to review materials. One student may have a question, the other two understand what the issue is and explain it. I was thrilled to answer questions for my buddies and I was grateful to them for answering mine. And, camaraderie develops; Bud Ellis and I plus two other students, now deceased, did this for months during our Celestial Navigation Course. We all passed in 1997. Separately, we had passed Junior Navigation, JN (Offshore Navigation) during the years just prior.

During this Blitzkrieg of information I managed to squeeze in Engine Maintenance, 1968, Marine electronics, 1971, Instructor Training, 1971, Weather, 1974, Sail, 1975 and Cruise Planning, 1975. I had become much more knowledgeable, sailing and cruising with confidence. So, what's my message? Take navigation courses in sequence and elevate your grade; take elective courses whenever you choose; perhaps there will be structured classroom courses for you or take them on-line.

Your joining the Cape Lookout Squadron may provide you with opportunities to instruct those who come after you. Teaching someone a nautical fact makes the world a better, safer place. Think about it! You have an opportunity to save lives, to make the boating world a happier, safer place for children and adults. Have at it! Education is the key word here. I would appreciate your connecting with me to say this message is/is not meaningful to you.
