# Administrative Officer Lt/C Clair Mixon



The Commander's granted the Administrative Officers a much needed holiday after a stellar year of activities and thus there is no Admin Officer report this month!



Have you ever wondered what is going on in that little magic box we call the GPS? Do you take what it is spitting out as gospel or do you question if it is always right, I will admit that over the last ten or so years they have gotten really good at what they can do. To really be able to get everything possible out of them it might be helpful to learn how all that information got in there. If you suddenly had a blank screen, could you SAFELY get into port?

Navigation is an art that has been practiced for centuries. Improvements came along with increased understanding of the marine environment and the development of the many kinds of aids to make the practice of navigation safer. As the early

mariners used the water to move from one place to another, they began make crude (by today's standards) maps so they could find the same place repeatedly. They started adding soundings to the maps so the would not run aground in the same place twice. They found out the Earth looked more like a ball than a sheet of paper, so ways were created to divide the ball into coordinates to record locations. The Chinese discovered certain metal containing rocks always pointed the same way when placed on something that floated on water. Improvements were made in how to tell time from an hourglass to John Harrison's watch. Strides were made to understand the motions of the heavenly bodies. All these changes have made moving a boat from one place to another safer, faster, and more fun.

If not, you will know exactly what needs to be done to be compliant with safety gear requirements by the US Coast Guard, the NC Wildlife Resources folks, or any state you happen to be boating.

Last year we had two squadron members complete a vessel safety check with our examiners. Hopefully 2025 will see better support of the VSE program from CLSPS members.

# Hornblower is Now With Cape Lookout ?!

'Tis a rare mariner who is unfamiliar with the name of Horatio Hornblower, and I'll wager most of the seafarers in Cape Lookout recognize the name of the legendary British naval officer made famous by C. S. Forester. The author wrote some eleven novels which cover the entire span of Hornblower's heroic and adventurous naval career from midshipman to admiral of the fleet.

About eight years ago, having completed a double tour as Commander of Peconic Bay Squadron and having read all of Forester's stories of Hornblower, I happened upon a volume at a library book sale entitled, <u>The Life</u> <u>and Times of Horatrio Hornblower</u> by a chap named C. Northcote Parkinson.

Aha, I thought, another novel to put with my collection of sea stories. I bought it, placed it in my library and waited for just the right evening to embark on another wild adventure with Hornblower. What ensued came as a rogue wave over the bow. Parkinson's "novel" was a biography of Hornblower. This was the very first inkling I had that C. S. Forester's Hornblower was, in face, a real person. Forester's works were actually colorful renditions of a factual life history.

Hornblower was born on 4 July 1776 in the village of Worth, near Sandwich, in Kent, England. His parents were Margaret (Rawson) and Jacob Hornblower, an apothecary.

After a lifetime of unimaginably daring naval escapades and romances Horatio passed on to his eternal reward at the age of eighty on 12 January 1857. He was in excellent health and was found by his second wife, Lady Barbara, slumped in his study armchair with Gibbon's <u>Decline and Fall of the Roman Empire</u> at his feet.

From the moment of my discovery that H. H. had been everything that C. S. Forester had documented in his wild "novels" I knew that I had a character for use in my writings for the Peconic Bay's newsletter, the <u>Tell Tale</u>.

Hornblower became a friend and fellow adventurer in the wild world of USPS. He has become one of us, and when Trudy and I relocated we brought him with us to New Bern to participate in the activities of our new squadron, Cape Lookout.

I ask the editor to show mercy when providing space in the <u>Outlook</u> as we have fun telling tales which apply to the objectives of USPS. Oh, you'll have to excuse me, I've got to be off. I'm scheduled to meet Horatio, in a short while, at the Duck Creek Small Boat Harbor. We'll be heading off in the Jolly Tar to have dinner aboard the H.M S. Lydia now anchored off Black Beacon Point. Later, I suspect we'll spend some time discussing the Cooperative Charting activities for the up-coming year.

Hornblower is looking forward to working with Cape Lookout and is planning to assist the Coast and Geodetic Survey of the National Ocean Service in updating our local charts.

Years ago I asked Chief Inspector Clewsew to help me uncover a candidate for a Cork Anchor Award, given for the best boating faux pas of the year. He poses as a sailmaker, frequently accompanies Horatio and me and refers to me as C/P. Look for him




